The termini change shortens the project from 3.4 miles to 3.1 miles;

Federal update by Sean Santalla, FHWA-TN; In April, the US Department of Transportation released a Notice of Funding Opportunity for the Fiscal Year 2021 Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) discretionary grant program. This grant program was formerly referred to as BUILD and TIGER. For Fiscal Year 2021, there is \$1 billion available nationwide, with a maximum grant award of \$25 million per project and no more than \$100 million to be awarded to a single State. 6. Update by Marc Corrigan, TDEC, on air quality;

The Montgomery County Limited Maintenance Plan is still working its way through EPA's signature chain.

Air Quality

Ozone season is upon us. On May 24th we may have had a couple ozone exceedances in the state (Nashville and the Smokies). Thankfully, not in the Clarksville area. Keep up those efforts to reduce ozone pollution precursors!

Preliminary 2020 PM2.5 data is in. The current design values for monitors in the Clarksville area for 2020 are shown below:

The annual PM2.5 NAAQS is set at a value of 12 ug/m³, and the daily PM2.5 NAAQS is set at a value of 35 ug/m³.

Volkswagen Diesel Settlement Environmental Mitigation Trust (VW Settlement EMT) Update TDEC announced that 26 entities will receive over \$9.7 Million dollars (\$9,724,683.74) in total grant funding to replace class 4-7 local freight trucks (medium trucks) and class 8 local freight trucks (large trucks) across the state.

Montgomery County was selected to receive \$500,000 for the replacement of 3 large diesel refuse trucks. Congratulations Montgomery County!

Mr. Williams indicated to the members by Governor Lee's Order 78 that conducting the meeting by electronic means was necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of everyone in light of the COVID-19 outbreak. He stated the protocol on how the virtual meeting would be run and asked that everyone in attendance to type their comments in the chat box throughout the meeting Page 2

and they will be addressed prior to the vote. He then turned the meeting over to Mayor Pitts, Executive Board Chairman.

Mayor Pitts called the meeting to order and thanked everyone for their attendance of the virtual meeting. He began with the first item on the agenda: the review, discussion and adoption of the minutes from the January 21, 2021 meeting. There were no comments to the minutes. Mr. Mahre made the motion to adopt the minutes and Mr. Nelson seconded the motion. The minutes were adopted unanimously.

Item #2 on the agenda was the review, discussion and adoption of Resolution 2021-06 to amend the FY2020-FY2023 TIP for a new TIP project #15, KY-115, from I-24 to Anderson Road, to improve and widen with center turn lane. Mr. Williams stated this project is a Kentucky project and less than a mile of it is within the MPO planning area. The portion within the MPO planning area was considered exempt for air quality and no conformity determination report was required by the IAC. Mr. Nelson made the motion to approve Resolution 2021-06 and Mr. Hall seconded the motion. The Resolution was adopted unanimously.

Item #3 on the agenda was the review, discussion and endorsement of Resolution 2021-07 for CTS's Safety Plan (Public Transit Agency Safety Plan — PTASP). Mr. Williams said CTS's Safety Plan was approved by TDOT in June 2020 and is a federal requirement. The Safety Plan has been modified into the MTP and TIP. Mr. Nelson stated the Safety Plan consisted of safety management, risk management and policies for safety and is in compliance with all federal regulations. Mr. Mahre made the motion to approve Resolution 2021-07 and Mr. Collins seconded the motion. The Resolution was adopted unanimously.

Item #4 on the agenda was the review and discussion of the KYTC CHAF sponsorship of projects by the MPO. Mr. Williams said the MPO is sponsoring the same three projects that it did in FY2019. The MPO submitted two projects, Walter Garrett Lane and Hugh Hunter Road, into the CHAF system to be considered in the future at the request of Mayor Jarvis. Mayor Jarvis asked that the MPO drop the priority #3, new route from Gate 4, and add in its place the Hugh Hunter Road project. She said there was a greater need for this project to reduce congestion and for safety concerns. Ms. Hall said she would make the changes in the KYTC SHAFT system.

Item #5 on the agenda was an update by Mr. Williams on the Covid relief funds. Mr. Williams stated he received a letter dated February 4th from Commissioner Bright listing the available covid relief funds of over \$800,000 for the Montgomery County/Clarksville area. Mr. Williams said there needed to be further discussions with the Mayors, Street Dept. and Highway Dept to decide how to best allocate the funds to a project. He said due to time restraints on when the funds must be spent, it's better to allocate to an existing project that is entering the ROW or CONST phase. Mr. Williams asked Mr. Witt if KYTC was allocating any of their Covid relief funds to the smaller MPOs. Mr. Witt said no, not at this time.

Item #6 on the agenda was an update on the bike/ped traffic counts by Mr. Williams. He said the MPO has been working with the TDOT Bike Coordinator to get infrared equipment count both bike and pedestrians. The plan to set up points in front of APSU at 8th Street, University Blvd, and Home Street. Once the counts are completed, he is hopeful the MPO area will qualify for funding. He is planning the counts will begin end of Summer or early Fall.

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Item #7 on the agenda was the update by Sean Santalla for FHWA-TN. Mr. Santalla said the Covid relief funds have priorities for the use of funding, how this will be reflected in the TIP, and the quick turnaround requirement. It is important for the MPOs to keep FHWA abreast of their decisions. The FY2021 RAISE Grant, formerly the TIGER grant program, published a notice of funding opportunity to apply for \$1 billion in discretionary grant funding. The maximum amount to apply for is \$25 million. The deadline to submit an application is July 12, 2021. The FHWA is tracking the reauthorization of funding and the census data with the Clarksville MPO close to the population threshold.

Item #8 on the agenda was the Bike / Health presentation by Bernadette Dupont for FHWA-KY. Ms. Dupont gave an excellent presentation on the correlation between health and biking/activity. The report showed both KY and TN needs to improve their overall health score, with KY rating 43/50 states and TN rating 44/50 states. Ms. Dupont introduces the bike/ped coordinators for the following agencies:

Darrin Grenfell – FHWA/KY; Sean Santalla – FHWA/TN; Rochelle Carpenter – TDOT, Troy Hearn – Health Program Administrator/KY; KYTC position is currently vacant. The presentation is on the home page of the MPO website, www.cuampo.com. Ms. Hall sent the presentation out to the TCC and Executive Board.

Item #9 was an update by Marc Corrigan, TDEC, on air quality. Mr. Corrigan said that the proposed Federal Register notice for the Montgomery County Limited Maintenance Plan is still in EPA's signature chain. He said that Montgomery County Bi-County Landfill did apply and awarded the replacement of three heavy-duty trucks through the VW mitigation settlement. Mr. Corrigan said the next funding through the VW mitigation settlement is for electric vehicle (EV) charging station will be released in the end of the 2nd to beginning of the 3rd quarter; in order to establish buildout infrastructure along the interstate system at 50 mile intervals.

Item #10 was new business from members of the public and/or MPO members. Mr. Williams said the next meeting will be May 13, 2021 at 2:00 pm to amend the MTP and TIP and corresponding short conformity determination report for TIP project #71, SR-237/Rossview Road. Mr. Preston, TDOT, said that CTS was awarded the Urban Transportation Block Grant (UTBG) from TDOT for their Strategic Plan and WSP Consultants were selected. Ms. Dupont provided information for the May 18th, KY Nature's Call to Action IV conference through the Chat box and said if you needed more info to email her.

Item #11 Mayor Pitts thanked the members for their service to their community and adjourned the meeting.

RESOLUTION 2021-08

APPROVING AN AMENDMENT TO THE 2045 METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN (MTP) WITH THE ASSOCIATED CONFORMITY DETERMINATON REPORT (CDR) FOR THE CLARKSVILLE URBANIZED AREA METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION (MPO)

WHEREAS, a comprehensive and continuing transportation planning program must be carried out cooperatively in order to ensure that funds for transportation projects are effectively allocated to the Clarksville Urbanized Area; and

WHEREAS, on January 17, 2019 the MPO adopted the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) as a blueprint for transportation investments based on a series of stated community goals, financial capability and environmental considerations; and

WHEREAS, the MPO has worked cooperatively with TDOT to amend the termini and project description to Project ID #517, SR-237/Rossview Road, in the 2045 MTP on Table 11.4 Stage II (2027-2036), page 11/8 and page 11/26.

Project ID #517, SR-237/Rossview Road information changes as follows:

- a. Termini changed from "east of International Blvd to east of Hayes Lane" to "east of International Blvd to east of Kirkwood Road."
- b. Length decreased from 3.4 miles to 3.1 miles;
- c. Total cost estimate remained the same at \$31,210,000 (the funds reduced by the length shortening is required for the added sidewalks);
- d. Project description changed by adding "Sidewalks will be provided";

WHEREAS, members of the Interagency Consultation agreed that this amendment is nonexempt from air quality conformity and required the associated CDR be provided for the 2045 MTP to meet the federal transportation conformity requirements in 40 CFR Part 93.

WHEREAS, the locally developed Participation Plan has been followed. The 14 - day public review period began on May 19, 2021 and ended June 2, 2021. Said document was made available for review; and

WHEREAS, members of the TCC did acknowledge re-demonstration of fiscal constraint and recommended approval for Amendment 2 and the associated CDR to the Executive Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Clarksville Urbanized Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's Executive Board does approve Amendment 2 of the 2045 MTP and the associated CDR of the Clarksville Urbanized Area.

WHEREAS, to amend the FY2020-FY2023 TIP for TIP# 71, SR237/Rossview Road to change the termini, project length and project description.

- a. Termini changed from "east of International Blvd to east of Hayes Lane" to "east of International Blvd to east of Kirkwood Road."
- b. Length decreased from 3.4 miles to 3.1 miles;
- c. Project description changed by adding "Sidewalks will be provided";
- d. Total cost estimate remained the same at \$31,210,000 (the funds reduced by the decrease in length is required for the added sidewalks);

WHEREAS, members of the Interagency Consultation (IAC) agreed that this amendment is nonexempt from air quality conformity and required the associated CDR be provided for the FY2020-FY2023 TIP to meet the federal transportation conformity requirements in 40 CFR Part 93; and

WHEREAS, the locally developed Participation Plan has been followed. The 14 - day public review period began on May 19, 2021 and ended June 2, 2021. Said document was made available for review; and





KYTC'S STRATEGIC HIGHWAY INVESTMENT FORMULA FOR TOMORROW (SHIFT) OVERVIEW AND BOOST POINT DISTRIBUTION INFORMATION

SHIFT is a data- driven process to allocate funding for Kentucky transportation priorities for the KYTC Highway Plan. It allows input at the local and district level, provides transparency, and establishes confidence in future federal and state infrastructure investments. The top priorities of the SHIFT process is to improve safety, preserve existing infrastructure through asset management, reduce congestion, encourage economic growth and spend tax dollars wisely.

The MPO first considers the data-driven component of project scores calculated by KYTC based on available quantitative data. The MPO reaches out to local officials and District 2 staff to discuss the project scoring and if the projects with the highest scores reflect the greatest needs in the MPO area, or if the project needs the boost points. The MPO then considers the following local priorities in addition to KYTC's and the MPO's joint priorities and assigns points to each project based on the project's ability to address these local priorities:

- The project's ranking in the MPO's Metropolitan Transportation Plan
- Consistency of the project with the MPO's Metropolitan Transportation Plan
- Consistency of the project with local comprehensive/master plans
- Project's ability to improve safety, access, and mobility for transit and non-motorized traffic.

(KYTC intends to let KY911 this year, but will sponsor it if needed) CO-Central office HDO - Hwy District Office The MPO's two highest scoring projects from the previous scoring in FY2017-FY2018 was the lighting project for KY115 at I-24, and the widening of KY115 from KY911 to I-24. These two projects are the top two sponsored projects again this time, and both address safety and congestion issues. The third sponsored project, Hugh Hunter Road widening, has been added to KYTC's system this year. The MPO, with assistance from KYTC District 2, stakeholders and local agencies, will decide between the three projects on which ones to apply their Boost points to improve their score.

With the addition of the MPO boost points and possibly the District boost points added to the projects that score well, the projects selected for Boost points should move forward in the Highway Plan.

These projects will greatly improve the transportation system within the MPO.


